OUR VISION

We believe in the potential of every child regardless of background or individual needs. We are committed to providing an emotionally supportive environment, where pupils flourish, growing both spiritually and academically; securing foundations for each child to understand who they are and the unique qualities they bring to the world.

INTRODUCTION:

This Accessibility Policy and Plan are drawn up in compliance with current legislation and requirements as specified in Schedule 10, relating to Disability, of the Equality Act 2010. School Governors are accountable for ensuring the implementation, review and reporting on progress of the Accessibility Plan over a prescribed period.

Principles:

1. We are committed to providing an accessible learning environment which values and includes all pupils, staff, parents and visitors regardless of their education, physical, sensory, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. We are committed to challenging negative attitudes about SEND and accessibility and to developing a culture of awareness, tolerance and inclusion.

2. Langafel CE Primary School plans, over time, to ensure the accessibility of provision for all pupils, staff and visitors to the school.

3. An Accessibility Plan will be reviewed every three years.

4. The Accessibility Plan will contain relevant actions to:

- Improve access to the **physical environment** of the school, adding specialist facilities as necessary. This covers reasonable adjustments to the physical environment of the school and physical aids to access education.
- Increase access to the **curriculum** for pupils with SEND, expanding and making reasonable adjustments to the curriculum as necessary to ensure that pupils with SEND are as, equally, prepared for life as are the able-bodied pupils; (If a school fails to do this they are in breach of the DDA). This covers teaching and learning and the wider curriculum of the school such as participation in after-school clubs, leisure and cultural activities or school visits.
- It also covers the provision of specialist **aids and equipment**, which may assist these pupils in accessing the curriculum. How the school uses adaptive teaching to ensure children can access what is being taught.
- Improve and make reasonable adjustments to the delivery of **written information** to pupils, staff, parents and visitors with disabilities. Examples might include hand-outs, timetables, textbooks and information about the school and school events. The information should be made available in various preferred formats within a reasonable time frame.

5. The Action Plan for physical accessibility relates to the Access Audit of the School. It may not be feasible to undertake some of the works during the first year of the plan and therefore some items will roll forward into subsequent years or plans. The audit will need to be revisited prior to the end of each three-year plan period in order to inform the development of the new Plan for the following period.

6. As curriculum policies are reviewed, a section relating to access will be added to that on Equality and Diversity. The terms of reference for the FGB will contain an item on “having regard to matters relating to Access”.

7. The School Prospectus will make reference to this Accessibility Plan.

8. The School’s complaints procedure covers the Accessibility Plan.

9. The Plan will be monitored by the FGB.

10. The Plan will be monitored by Ofsted as part of their inspection cycle.

11. We acknowledge that there is a need for on-going awareness raising and training for staff and governors in the matter of disability discrimination and the need to inform attitudes on this matter.

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION

Langafel Primary School was originally used as a middle school and has extensive grounds and premises that has been extended on several occasions.

The school is a single story building

ACCESSIBILITY AUDIT AND PLAN

This audit and plan covers all three main strands of the planning duty:

1. Physical environment access- improving the extent to which SEND students are able to take advantage of education and intervention.

The physical environment includes things such as steps, stairways, kerbs, exterior surfaces and paving, parking areas, building entrances and exits (including emergency escape routes), internal and external doors, gates, toilets and washing facilities, lighting, ventilation, floor coverings, signs and furniture. Aids to physical access include ramps, handrails, widened doorways, electromagnetic doors, adapted toilets and washing facilities, adjustable lighting, blinds, induction loops and way-finding systems.

Constraints – Langafel CE Primary is a relatively old building with, steps to the Foundation and LKS2 area. The school will take reasonable measures to ensure access which may include access to these areas via other doors. However financial, practical and design constraints do apply.

2. Curriculum Access - increase the extent to which SEND students can participate and achieve within the schools' curriculum.

The curriculum covers a range of elements that includes ensuring that teaching and learning is accessible through school and classroom organization and support, deployment of staff, timetabling, curriculum options and staff information and training.

Many adjustments to access will be dependent on individual needs. These needs are detailed within any EHCP plans, personalised plans and provision maps.

Adaptive teaching is used across the school, which offers resources such as word lists, working walls, displays, widgets, adult support, supportive vocabulary, communication boards etc to enable children to access the work set.

Physical aids to access education cover things such as ICT equipment, enlarged computer screens and keyboards, concept key boards, switches, specialist desks and chairs and portable aids for children with motor coordination and poor hand/eye skills, such as extra robust scientific glassware and talk tins, specialist pens and pencils. Children may wish to use standing desks, wobble cushions, chair bands, coloured paper and books, fiddle toys or ear defenders to help them. Movement breaks, sensory circuits, breakout areas, forest school, now and next boards, task management boards are also used where needed.

Children with SEMH needs may wish to access nurturing resources such as play therapy, Thrive, ABC, The Ark, Nurture classroom, forest schools, zones of emotion, school dog or snake, OPAL or individualised support from the pastoral team and wellbeing warriors.

3. Access to Written Information - improving the delivery of information to students with SEND

Any students requiring additional support are clearly identified on entry to Langafel CE Primary School and throughout their career. Those requiring specific support with communication are known by staff so their needs can be met in lessons through adaption and resources. Staff understand the barriers to learning for each child on the SEN register within their class. Children with visual stress are screened and provided with appropriate coloured paper and books. Many of the adaptive teaching resources mentioned above can be used to aid access to written communication.
